The L.A. City Council Redistricting Commission (LACCRC)

Core Purpose:

- Draw proposed boundaries based on census data and applicable law that will allocate constituents proportionately
- Account for the unique histories, experiences and interests of communities
- Provide for the highest probability of being served by elected representatives and the City.

The LACCRC Composition

21 Members Appointed by LA Elected Officials

- Mayor Garcetti (3)
- City Council President (1)
- City Council (1 appointment per each of 15 Districts = 15)
- City Attorney (1 appointment)
- City Controller (1 appointment)

Basic Commission Structure: Monthly meetings + Committees

- Chair: Commissioner Fred Ali
- Two Vice Chairs: Community Outreach & Data/Mapping Committees
- Executive Director: Mr. Frank Cardenas
- Support: City Attorney, Chief Legislative Analyst, Additional LACCRC Staff

The LACCRC Mission Statement

Vision: To strengthen the governance of the City of Los Angeles by empowering its communities to have their diverse needs served through fair and inclusive representation.

What is Redistricting?

Redistricting is defined as **drawing new boundaries** that determine which residents are represented by each elected official.

- Population changes (births, deaths, migration into and out of City of LA) counted by U.S. Census 2020
- Areas where there were once roughly the same number of people become unequal
- Communities change (priorities, interests, goals, make up of community)

Which Laws Govern Redistricting?

- U.S. Constitution
- Los Angeles City Charter
- Federal Voting Rights Act
- California Elections Code
- California Constitution
- Case Law

The Constitution and the Census

The U.S. Constitution requires that every American receive as close to equal political representation as possible:

- Equal Protection Clause: "One Person, One Vote"
- Prevent over-representation or under-representation in government
- No "gerry-mandering": Must "even out" the population between districts and create districts with the same number of people
- Deviation of <10% is "presumptively valid", based on criteria (e.g., natural boundaries, neighborhoods, communities of interest)

The Constitution and the Census

All jurisdictions must update boundaries based on Census:

- CALIFORNIA STATE: The California Redistricting Commission (Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly and State Board of Equalization) Districts
- L.A. COUNTY: The LA County Redistricting Commission (5 Supervisors)
- L.A. SCHOOLS: The LA Unified School Redistricting District (LAUSD) (7 Districts)
- L.A. CITY: LA City Council Commission (15 Council Districts)

L.A. City Charter Redistricting Provisions

- Divides the City into **15 Council Districts** (§ 241)
- Requires that Council District lines be redrawn at least every 10 years (§ 204)
- Creates Redistricting Commission to obtain public input, prepare a redistricting proposal and present it to the City Council (§ 204)
- Provides the City Council with the ultimate authority to adopt a redistricting plan (§ 204)

L.A. City Charter Requirements

- Council districts "contain, as nearly as practicable, equal portions of the total population of the City as shown by the Federal Census" (§ 204(a))
- Districts conform to state and federal redistricting law (§ 204(d))
- Districts "keep neighborhoods and communities intact, utilize natural boundaries or street lines, and be geographically compact and continguous" to the extent feasible (§ 204(d))

Federal Voting Rights Act

Voting Rights Act of 1965 (Section 2):

- Prohibits any voting practice or procedure that "results in a denial or abridgement" of the right to vote based on race, color or language minority status
- Prohibits redistricting plans that result in "vote dilution" by depriving minority voters of an equal opportunity to elect a candidate of their choice
- Cannot "fracture" or "pack" minority voters

Line Drawing Criteria

The Commission must follow these criteria, in this order. Districts must be:

- 1. Of nearly equal population to comply with the US Constitution.
- 2. Comply with the Voting Rights Act to ensure that minorities have a fair opportunity to elect representatives of their choice.
- 3. Drawn **contiguously**, so that all parts of the district are connected to each other.
- 4. **Minimize the division** of neighborhoods and communities of interest to the extent possible.
- Geographically compact such that nearby areas of population are not bypassed for more distant populations. (This requirement refers to density, not shape).

In addition, the place of residence of any **incumbent or candidate** cannot be considered and districts may not favor or discriminate against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party.

"Communities of Interest"

Communities of Interest (COIs) are defined as a concentrated population which shares <u>common social and economic interests</u> that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

Examples: Income level, education background, housing patterns (urban, rural, suburban), cultural and language, employment and economic patterns (e.g., transportation, work), health and environmental conditions.

A **Community of Interest** is not the same as a district, but COIs are key building blocks of districts. Some ways to describe your community:

- Geographic (waterways, rural, urban, mountains)
- Community or Service Boundaries (neighborhoods, school areas)
- Things you have in common

Your Voice Matters

Political Boundaries can:

- Make the difference between empowering and maximizing the voters' voices—or minimizing and muting those voices.
- Exclude communities from **political power**, if unfairly drawn or not reflective of common interests.

Your Voice and Full Participation can:

- Ensure democracy
- Help shape the **new political boundaries**
- Ensure the opportunity to **elect candidates** of your choice.
- Help keep your **community and neighborhood** "whole"

We Need Your Voices DESCRIBE, DRAW, SEND

Your input is vital to the success of the Commission. Here are three simple steps to participate:

- 1. DESCRIBE your community. What are your shared interests? What brings you together? What is important to your community? Are there nearby areas you want (or do not want) to be in a district with? Why or why not?
- 2. DRAW your community on a map with new user-friendly software.
- **3. SEND** your testimony directly to the Commission.
