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### HOT TOPICS For July 13, 2023

The **Regional Housing Needs Assessment** (RHNA) is a process mandated by California state law that requires that cities and unincorporated areas of counties to plan for new housing to accommodate projected growth. RHNA operates on an eight-year cycle.

- 1. WHAT IS 2021-2029 Housing Element?
  - Identifies the City's housing conditions and needs, establishes goals, objectives, and policies to guide future housing decisions, and provides an array of programs to meet Citywide Housing Priorities, including: addressing the housing shortage, advancing racial equity and access to opportunity, preventing displacement and promoting sustainability and resilience. California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) informed the City of Los Angeles that its 2021-2029 Housing Element was in full compliance with State law.

- 2. The five goals that will guide the 2021-2029 Housing Elements are as follows:
  - Goal 1 A City where housing production results in an amply supply of housing to create more equitable and affordable options that meet existing and projected needs.
  - Goal 2 A City that preserves and enhances the quality of housing and provides greater housing stability for households of all income levels.
  - Goal 3 A city in which housing creates healthy, livable, sustainable, and resilient communities that improve the lives of all Angelenos.
  - Goal 4 A City that fosters racially and socially inclusive neighborhoods and corrects the harms of historic racial, ethnic, and social discrimination of the past and present.
  - Goal 5 A City that is committed to preventing and ending homelessness.

### LA City Housing Element – An opportunity for NCs to collaborate, to speak for their communities, and to help maintain vibrant livable neighborhoods.

NCs often focus on immediate and short-term issues facing their communities. The Housing Element is something different – it will have a dramatic and forever lasting impact on our communities and Los Angeles. What will Los Angeles be like in the distant future? The Housing Element will define that future.

The Department of City Planning (DCP) is working on the LA City Housing Element and the rezoning of Los Angeles. NCs need to understand how the Housing Element and the impact of recent CA State laws will impact their single-family, multi-family, retail, and commercial areas. The proposed zoning, as is, could have long-term negative impacts on the quality of life of residents.

The opportunity to have input into the draft ordinance that is to be released late this fall is NOW. It is important and should be a focus of **NCs to let their Council Member know** how they would like their communities to grow and develop. **NCs should collaborate with other NCs within their shared Council Member's district to make sure their voices are heard.** 

### Here are a few points to consider:

- > The Department of City Planning (DCP) will be proposing the rezoning of single-family and multi-family neighborhoods by the Fall of this year.
- The rezoning will allow 4-5 story apartments in single-family neighborhoods and could eliminate some of the affordable existing multi-family housing.
- ➤ The State RHNA (Regional Housing Needs Assessment) target for the period 2021-2029 mandates that LA must zone for 486,379 housing units. Current zoning provides for 230,964 housing units. Rezoning must allow for an additional 255,000 housing units by 2029. The current Housing Element has provided for rezoning for 1,400,000 housing units over 5 times the needed number.
- Rather than upzoning primarily residential parcels, the City can meet the necessary incremental RHNA housing unit target by focusing on development along major corridors. Such a focus would maintain single-family and multi-family residential neighborhoods while developing necessary housing along transportation corridors.
- > Once parcels are "upzoned" they cannot be "downzoned" in the future.
- ➤ Other items that should be considered as part of the rezoning in the Housing Element are access to transportation, walkability, open spaces and parks, parking, and economic development and growth.

Again, as individuals or a single neighborhood council our Council Members can question the support of the community on this issue. The focus should not be on rezoning single-family and multi-family neighborhoods. We need to work together and let our Council Members know that we are in favor of thoughtful intelligent growth along corridors and other currently available spaces.
